R. 51 E. (Not Cedar nor Cherry.)

Maynadier

Named for Lieut. H. E. Maynadier, who made an expedition from the Stockade, now Glendive, into the territory through which Maynadier Creek flows, and who was breveted Lieut.-Col. for distinguished service against the Indians.

Local usage

Restoration of old name to solve present confusion as to whether Cherry Creek flows into Cedar Creek or vice versa.) (OVER)

Roy L. Stith, Co. Surveyor., letter 4-27-32: On the Reynolds Map 1859-60 Revised, it gives the name as Cedar or Maynadler Creek. In report of the Secretary of War, Vol. 1, 1877-78 the upper part of this creek is called Cedar Creek. Because of simplicity it has all been called Cedar Creek. On some local maps it was called Cedar Creek. Then some called it Cherry Creek. On most of the State of Montana Maps that portion after the junction is not named at all.

But on the Government Plats giving the Section Corner Survey by Townships, it shows and gives Cedar and Cherry Creek as joining and forming Maynadler Creek. On Township Plats as on file in the U.S. Land Office of; T. 13 N., R. 50 E., it gives and shows Cedar Creeks as joining and forming Maynadler Creek. On sectional survey Plat of T. 13 N., R. 50 E., as surveyed by Bickel and Filer in Sept., 1900 it shows Maynadler Creek as flowing through Section 25. On Plat of T. 13 N., R. 51 E., it shows Maynadler Creek flowing through Sections 30, 31, 32.
