Adopted name. Hali Murk

Description a small village about 3 miles southeast of Pisinimo, 4 miles northeast of Kom Vo, and 6 1/2 miles northwest of Kupk, near lat. 32°00' N., long. 112°17'30" W., ~~Pisin Mo District~~, Papago Indian Reservation, Pima County, Ariz. Hali Murk is a Papago name that means "squash burned."  
(Not Harlemuheta nor Hardimui.)

<u>Local usage</u>	

The recommended name is the name generally used and understood. There is no alternative. The recommended spelling is considered the best possible phonetization of the Papago name. (Off. Ind. Aff., 9/8/39)

Hardimui ("burnt pumpkin") is a summer rancheria with extensive fields, mostly inclosed in brush fences. There are a few scattered houses and brush arbors occupied by the Indians when sowing and harvesting their crops. (U.S.G.S., W.S. Paper 499, p. 353.)
