Probably named for Lieut. (later Major General) John G. Parke, who was Chief Astronomer and Surveyor for the United States on the International Boundary Commission of 1857-1869, and who may have ascended this mountain, which is one of the triangulation peaks of the boundary survey. (G.C.M.)
